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Freida Parker Steele



Recently, we shared the sad news that a pillar of the community, Freida Parker Steele, passed away on September 22nd. The Parker family is full of trailblazers and Freida was no exception. While attending Patterson Collegiate, she won awards for scholastics and athletics. She also graduated as class president, which was the first time that someone of African descent claimed that honour.

Her impact on nursing is also significant. Shortly before she graduated from Hotel Dieu of the St. Joseph School of Nursing in Windsor, Black Canadian women were barred from attending nursing school. As a result of this discrimination, the case was taken to the Ontario Human Rights Commission and in 1948 Colleen L. Campbell and Marian V. Overton became the first Black women to graduate from Hotel Dieu. It was not long after, in 1950, that Freida and Cecile Wright would graduate, becoming the third and fourth Black students to accomplish this.

Freida was also involved with several organizations. She was one of the first volunteers for Windsor's Hospice, in addition to being a Board Director for the Museum and on the Board of Maryvale. She was also the secretary-treasurer for the Windsor and District Institute of Human Rights, which was an organization that drew attention to the problems of minority groups. While in this organization, Freida worked alongside executive members, Alex Maxwell and the late Dr. Howard McCurdy.

Freida and her husband, Eugene Steele, who was the first Black firefighter in Windsor, were also part of The Guardian Club which brought attention to discrimination in Windsor and surrounding areas. This organization performed a series of test cases, particularly with discriminatory housing practices. For example, the group would send a Black Canadian couple to view a house or apartment, in addition to another couple, but they would be white. What they found was that the white couple would be offered the rental, while the former couple would be told that the property was no longer available. These test cases drew a lot of attention to discriminatory practices in the area.

We wish comfort to Freida's children Janice, Alan, Dianne, Cherie, Gina and Deborah, along with other family and friends. Recently, Freida's daughter Dianne shared a lesson passed on in the Parker Family: "Give what you can to help those in need. Share what you've got." These are certainly words that Freida lived by.

years, and the sereneness gives me the ability to raise and train my children the way I want to, with its diversity allowing them to learn from people of all tribes and color.



On October 12th, at the Libro Centre, the Amherstburg Freedom Museum will launch its Freedom Achievers Program, which developed out of our 2017 Amherstburg Freedom Summit. The Summit welcomed young persons of colour and asked them to discuss the challenges they face, but also solutions to create positive change. We are implementing their suggestions through our Freedom Achievers Program which consists of two parts: a mentorship program that connects mentees with successful mentors, with professional experience, who will provide valuable advice and guidance as the mentees transition from university/college to their chosen career, and a high-profile speaker series. Our first speaker is Dwane Casey, Coach of the Detroit Pistons, who will share career advice, but also how he overcame obstacles in order to achieve success.

Dear Freedom Achievers Supporter,



The town of Amherstburg has one of Southern Ontario's richest histories, especially when discussing its significance on the Underground Railroad. The Amherstburg Freedom Museum's Nazrey A.M.E. Church was a haven for countless African Americans fleeing enslavement and offered these newcomers the assistance they needed to start their new life in freedom. This Church remains a tribute to the bravery and perseverance of Black settlers.

It was Mac and Betty Simpson's dream to build a museum that preserved our heritage and shared Black history with the world. They believed that social, economic and educational problems could be addressed more effectively by people with a greater self-awareness and pride in their own history. Our goal is to share this impactful history with people of all ages, which is why we hosted The Amherstburg Freedom Summit that welcomed young persons of colour and asked them to discuss the challenges they face, but also solutions to create positive change.

A prevailing suggestion was a mentorship program and speaker series, which is why we have created the Freedom Achievers Program. Our initiative includes a mentoring program that will recruit successful achievers as mentors in professional fields such as First Responders, S.T.E.M., Arts & Entertainment, Education, Legal, Medical, Business & Finance. The mentoring sessions will provide insight into career options and actively engage with mentees. We will also host a High-Profile Speakers Series called "Achieving Freedom in the 21st Century" that welcomes at least four diverse high-profile community builders to discuss the challenges they faced and how they challenged issues such as racism, gender inequality and homophobia to create positive change.

We are partnering with the Amherstburg Community Foundation on this event and we are thrilled that Dwane Casey, Head Coach of the Detroit Pistons, will kick off our High-Profile Speakers Series, but we need your help to make this happen. 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
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
