The WSO celebrates Black composers, performing Samuel Coleridge-Taylor's Four Novelettes. He was a British composer of mixed-race heritage, a descendant of an African-American soldier. A late 19th Century Romantic powerhouse, Coleridge-Taylor wrote in the style of Dvorák. Adolphus Hailstork's work, Sonata da Chiesa (Church Sonata), represents his African, Native-American, and European roots. Conducted by Geoffrey Larson.



Black History Month 2025 Celebrated with Over Thirty Local Events



Once again the Amherstburg Freedom Museum and Essex County Black Historical Research Society have compiled a comprehensive Black History Month activity schedule. Find it at https:// amherstburgfreedom.org/bhm (or look under Events on the museum site.) Hosting the calendar is a valuable service we provide annually, with many other organizations, individuals, media, elected officials, and even municipalities sharing the link with followers for easy access to the wide array of local Black History Month observances.

The 2025 Joint Windsor-Essex Annual Black History Month Kickoff took place on January 31st at the Caribbean Centre, once again as a collaboration between the Essex County Black Historical Research Society, the Amherstburg Freedom Museum, and the Windsor West Indian Association. Replete with music, poetry, and

history highlights, the standing-room-only event was a fitting start to a monthlong celebration that will see over thirty events taking place across Essex County throughout February... and thanks once again to sponsors and donors, the Kickoff was a free event.





African American historian Carter G. Woodson established Negro History Week in 1926. By the 1970s, it had evolved into Black History Month in both the U.S. and Canada. In December 1995, the House of Commons officially recognized February as Black History Month, following a motion introduced by the first Black Canadian woman elected to Parliament, the Honourable Jean Augustine. The motion was carried unanimously by the House.

Over thirty local events have been made available to the public in celebration of Black History Month 2025!

Celebrating the Arts and Black History in Partnership with the River Bookshop



On February 8th, the Museum and our partners at River Bookshop welcomed Craig Shreve, author of *The African Samurai*, for a reading and book signing in Nazrey A.M.E. Church.

Craig Shreve was born and raised in North Buxton, Ontario, and is a descendant of Abraham Doras Shadd, the first Black person in Canada to be elected to public office. His debut novel *One Night in Mississippi* (Dundurn, 2015) has been optioned for film by Birchall Entertainment, and *The African Samurai* (Simon & Schuster Canada, 2023) has been translated into twelve languages. It was named one of 2023's best novels by *The Miramichi Reader* and *Quill & Quire*. The critically acclaimed historical novel is based on the true story of Yasuke, the celebrated Black Samurai who lived a remarkable life in 16th century Japan.



On **February 16th at 2:00 p.m.,** the Museum and River Bookshop will host a **Storytime Circle at the Bookshop,** featuring students from the Black Joy Club at Amherstburg Public School. Four exemplary intermediate/senior students will read books to younger audience members, centering **local Black history**, and will share some local stories. The books being read live will include *Meet Mary Ann Shadd* and *All Aboard!: Elijah McCoy's Steam Engine.* Thanks to educator Raquel Hurst for coordinating the student readers! All kids accompanied by an adult are welcome to attend this free event.

The Artists of Colour Present *The Never-Ending Quest for Inclusion* at the Museum through March 2nd.

The Amherstburg Freedom Museum is pleased to host The Artists of Colour special exhibit *The Never-Ending Quest for Inclusion* through

March 2nd. Our first and second floors have been transformed into a visually rich arts experience, presenting materials from the Museum's permanent collection alongside artists' interpretations of the people, places, and stories that make up Black history in Southwestern Ontario and beyond. This special presentation is a fine-arts based project displaying a combination of paintings, images, artifacts, and history information panels. QR codes are displayed on each information panel to help create a seamless way to engage further with the learning experience.



Formed in 2008, The Artists of Colour have formed a collective comprising artists whose mandate is to speak through the visual, written, and oral language of art.

The Price of Freedom: Don't Miss the World Premiere February 28th at Windsor's Capitol Theatre



When Carlos Anthony learned about the story of freedom seeker John Anderson during a visit to the Amherstburg Freedom Museum, he was instantly intrigued.

"John Anderson's story captivated me from the start," says the author, filmmaker, and playwright. "I had never heard of an enslaved person who not only escaped but also got away with murder, changed laws, and altered relationships between Canada and the United States. That combination of defiance, survival, and systemic impact immediately felt like a story that could inspire others—especially Black youth.

"As I delved deeper, I began viewing the Underground Railroad through a new lens, almost like a spy war story rather than just a series of traumatic events. This perspective felt fresh and transformative. If stories like these were told this way when I was younger, I think I would have been far more


engaged with Black history. It felt like my duty as a storyteller to reshape the narrative and spark a similar excitement in others."

Born enslaved in Missouri, John Anderson killed a man in self-defence along his Underground Railroad journey to Canada in 1853. Years later, his dramatic extradition case was a source of controversy for many members of the Canadian public as well as cause for concern for freedom seekers who had valid reasons to fear a dangerous new legal precedent that could threaten their own liberty.

The original play *The Price of Freedom,* a collaboration between the Amherstburg Freedom Museum and Arts Collective Theatre, will debut at Windsor's Capitol Theatre at the end of February 2025. Written by seasoned author but first-time playwright Carlos Anthony, and directed by ACT's Chris Rabideau, the play is one of the highlights in the Amherstburg Freedom Museum's fiftieth anniversary schedule of activities. A performance for local school groups has already sold out, but members of the general public still have an opportunity to pick up tickets to the February 28th, March 1st, and March 2nd performances.

The journey to this production began when Amherstburg Freedom Museum Vice President Barbara Porter connected with Arts Collective Theatre board members Shelly Davis, Chris Rabideau, and Moya McAlister to find out whether ACT would be interested in collaborating on a short play at the museum.

"It was an idea that I had that was going to be on a smaller scale," Porter explains. "I imagined a show in Nazrey A.M.E.





Church. Actors dressed as freedom seekers would burst into the back, saying 'Are we here? Are we here in Freedom Land?' Then they would make their way to the stage and talk about their experiences and their struggles. But Chris imagined something on a bigger scale."

"When we were first approached about collaborating on this project with the museum, I don't think we even thought about it," says Moya McAlister, Vice President of Arts Collective Theatre. "We immediately said 'Yes! That's perfect!' Our social justice shows have always been partnerships with an organization in our community, so this original work that we've been doing as the first show of the year has always been a collaboration with a local organization."


Artistic Director Chris Rabideau adds, "Barb Porter reached out to us through a board member, Shelly Davis, and wanted us to do something in collaboration or at least to speak to the 50th anniversary of the museum. I said 'Barb, if I'm going to put that time into doing it then we're going to do it right.' So we turned this into our project that we do yearly, a show with a message. This was a year ago. And what a compliment to have chosen ACT. It fits who we are and it's perfect." The show also features an original score by acclaimed composer Ian Smith. "It will be an event!" says Rabideau.

For Carlos Anthony, the most important goal is to raise awareness of John Anderson and his story. "John is a brave man who takes his fate into his own hands," says Anthony. "He's not waiting for a saviour—he's doing whatever it takes to survive. I relate deeply to that instinct. I became a father as a teenager and was homeless at 18, so I know what it's like to navigate a world that sees you one way while you feel something entirely different inside.

"John is a hero and an inspiration," he adds. "His story of sacrifice and perseverance resonates far beyond his time, and I hope it will inspire Black youth to see themselves as capable of overcoming immense obstacles. At his core, John is a man trying to survive in a system that is designed to oppress him. That struggle is not so different from the challenges we face in today's capitalist system, where the disparity between the 1% and the 99% mirrors many of the inequities of John's time."

"This is what we do," says Barbara Porter. "We educate and we preserve information from the past. We are Underground Railroad descendants and it's the mandate of the museum to teach the public about the realities of slavery and the struggles generations of Blacks have gone through. And we hope that teachers will teach students about this case, about John Anderson, before and after the play. It's such an important story for everyone to know."

"With the premiere just weeks away, I'm feeling a mix of excitement and disbelief," says Anthony. "It's surreal to think that my first-ever play will be performed in front of thousands of people.... It's been a blessing to learn, develop, and contribute to telling this important story, and I couldn't be more honored to be part of such a meaningful milestone for the museum."




Happening February 20th: A Tasty Way for Amherstburg Residents to Support the Museum at Naples Pizza

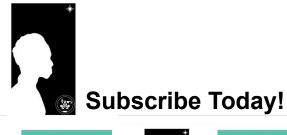
